Legislative Session is over. The Senior Caucus chose to focus on three important legislative priorities likely to have significant positive impacts on seniors. These were:

- Caregiver Workforce Shortage: Addressing the current health care workforce shortages in nursing homes, assisted living and in-home settings through higher wages and other recruitment strategies to restore staffing levels and prevent closure of senior facilities.
- The Task Force on Aging: This task force, appointed by the Governor and the legislature, is created to identify and prioritize necessary support for an aging population to remain in their communities.
- Funds for Senior Nutrition: This proposal is to increase funding for senior nutrition such as meals preparation and distribution (meals on wheels, congregate dining and food shelves) provided through Area Agencies on Aging was passed.

The Senior Caucus provided letters of support, in person testimony, and on-going monitoring of hearings on-line or in person. Lots of work this session!

Membership - We still have just shy of 600 members. We need all of you to help out in 2023 to gear up for the next election cycles. Please help your local Chapter. Senior Caucus Legislative Priorities

Update for June 14, 2023

The Senior Caucus chose to focus on three important legislative priorities likely to have significant positive impacts on seniors. These were:

 Caregiver Workforce Shortage: Addressing the current health care workforce shortages in nursing homes, assisted living and in-home settings through higher wages and other recruitment strategies to restore staffing levels and prevent closure of senior facilities. An additional \$1 billion is being invested in home and community based services (HCBS) and nursing home support although some funding is short term.

- The Task Force on Aging: This task force, appointed by the Governor and the legislature, is created to identify and prioritize necessary support for an aging population to remain in their communities. It must seek input from a wide array of stakeholders and provide recommendations by January 15, 2025.
- Funds for Senior Nutrition: After years of static funding creating food assistance waiting lists for seniors, especially in rural areas, this proposal to increase funding for senior nutrition such as meals preparation and distribution (meals on wheels, congregate dining and food shelves) provided through Area Agencies on Aging was passed. Significant additional funding was approved, although it is short term.

The PAC provided letters of support, in person testimony and on-going monitoring of hearings on-line or in person. The PAC notified members of status reports, hearings, opportunities and instructions for individual comments.

Thanks to the DFL trifecta and committee leadership, all three priority issues were approved by the legislature.

The PAC monitored other key legislation identified as important. We sent status updates and monitored and collaborated with AARP on increased tax exemptions for Social Security and with labor retiree organizations on the Family Leave Act.

The PAC is now in the planning phase for the 2023-2024 agenda in which the 2024 election will be paramount. The PAC will continue to solicit member input for legislative priorities for the 2024 session, to update and revise screening questionnaires as needed for candidate screening for 2024. The PAC also expects to further expand support to endorsed candidates,

follow up with elected legislators, and improve GOTV efforts.

The DFL Senior Caucus wants to thank all the members who worked on these issues during the 2023 legislative session. Thanks for providing testimony; speaking, talking and visiting with legislators and their staff, responding to action alerts, etc.

TECHNICAL TIP OF THE MONTH

Ask a Techie

Readers asked: What is the best way to access the Internet?

Before I answer that question, it might be helpful to define a few concepts: what is a network, what is the Internet, and how are these different from the Cloud? A network connects things together. The road system is a network that connects cities, homes, businesses, etc. A vehicle enters the public road system from a private location, makes a series of turns, and delivers its contents to a second private location. The Internet system carries packets of information from network connections (analogous to vehicles and driveways), through a series of networks (analogous to roads), through several routers (analogous to intersections), to deliver the packets to their destination

connections. The packets contain pieces of email, web pages, Zoom calls, printer files, etc. This all happens automatically when you use computer programs to access these services. Notice that Internet is capitalized—that's because it's a proper name for the set of all networks working together.

The Cloud is a term for computers, datastorage locations, etc., outside your home where some work is done instead of doing it on your own computer. Google Drive and Google Docs are some examples of Cloud services. (You might already be storing backups for your iPhone or iPad on Apple's iCloud.)

Access to the Internet comes in many forms: WiFi access at businesses, shared access at community residences (that contract for phone/TV/Internet through a single provider), DSL (telephone wires), cable-service providers (coax cable), fiber optic (glass fiber cable), cellphone providers (cellphone or base-station hot spot), Starlink (radio through satellites and ground stations), and some others that are less frequently used. Most of these technologies use a modem to provide a single connection and a router (intersection) to allow you to connect many separate devices within your own home. Your in-home connections may be wired (more reliable) or wireless WiFi (convenient).

The best access method for you depends a lot on where you live. The service-providers' wires, cables, and radio signals that come to your property line constrain your options. Speed, reliability, and cost vary widely. All of the technologies have limitations, such as speeds and the amount of data you can access per billing cycle. Some technologies (cellphones, satellites) may be portable if you like to travel. Ask your neighbors how they use the Internet and ask which provider they have if their use is similar to yours.

Public WiFi access is a whole topic by itself—there are security concerns with this.

I know you were hoping for a simple answer, but maybe this background information will give some insights as you navigate the jungle that is the Internet!

IMPORTANT DATES/EVENTS OF THE MONTH

- July 19 Hijri New Year: this day marks the start of the Islamic New Year — beginning the prior evening https://ing.org/resources/for-all-groups/calendar-of-important-islamic-dates/islamic-new-year-information-sheet/
- June 19th is <u>Juneteenth</u>. In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation. Nearly two and a half years later, on June 19th, 1865, the enslaved African Americans of Galveston, Texas got the news by way of the Union army troops that freedom had come at last.
- June 26 July 1 is <u>The Hajj</u> in the Muslim faith. The Hajj is the annual Islamic pilgrimage to Mecca. This pilgrimage is a mandatory religious duty for Muslims that must be carried out at least once in their lifetime by all who are physically and financially capable of undertaking the journey.
- July 26 Americans with Disabilities Act anniversary: This law protects people with disabilities from being discriminated against https://lawlibguides.sandiego.edu/ada_history
- June 28 July 2 is <u>Eid-al-Adha</u> also in Islam. *Eid al-Adha* or the Feast of Sacrifice is the second and the larger of the two main holidays celebrated in Islam (the other being *Eid al-Fitr*).
- August 9 International Day of the World's Indigenous People: This day was created by the UN to celebrate the culture of indigenous people on a global scale https://www.un.org/en/observances/indigenous-day/background

The month of June is LGBT+ Pride Month. In the metro <u>Twin Cities Pride</u> has a lot of information events. *LGBT Pride Month is a month, typically June, dedicated to celebration and commemoration of lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender pride. Pride Month began after the* Stonewall riots, a series of gay liberation protests in 1969, and has since spread outside of the United States.
